












NABU, The Nature and Biodiversity Conservation Union is

Project achievements - highlights

- Official recognition of Lake Tana as UNESCO biosphere reserve in June 2015
- Management structures established incl. Management Plan
- Participatory zonation and legal protection of core zones
- Additional income for local communities created by
 - introducing Conservation Agriculture
 - educating women for honey production
 - training people in producing herbal plants
 - developing ecotourism infrastructure
- Preservation of last forests by
 - reforestation with ~275,000 indigenous trees
 - Natural fencing against wild grazing livestock
 - introducing 1,000 energy saving stoves to families
- Conservation of four wetlands by
 - Introducing community management
 - offering alternative income schemes
 - capacity building at local and regional level
